

4 THINGS TO KNOW ABOUT THE END OF TIME

1. Sleeping is both natural and tragic.

1 Thessalonians 4:13-14—Brothers and sisters, we <u>do not want you to be uninformed</u> about those who <u>sleep</u> in death, <u>so that you do not grieve</u> like the rest of mankind, who have no hope. For we believe that <u>Jesus died and rose again</u>, and so we believe that God will bring with Jesus those who have fallen <u>asleep</u> in him.

2. The timing is both predictable and unpredictable.

1 Thessalonians 4:15-5:1—<u>According to the Lord's word</u>, we tell you that <u>we who are still alive</u>, who are left until the coming of the Lord, <u>will certainly not precede</u> those who have <u>fallen</u> <u>asleep</u>. For the <u>Lord himself will come down</u> from heaven, with a <u>loud command</u>, with the voice of the <u>archangel</u> and with the <u>trumpet</u> call of God, and the <u>dead in Christ will rise first</u>. <u>After that</u>, we who are <u>still alive and are left</u> will be <u>caught up together</u> with them <u>in the clouds</u> to <u>meet the Lord in the air</u>. And so we will be <u>with the Lord forever</u>. Therefore <u>encourage one another</u> with these words. Now, <u>brothers and sisters</u>, <u>about times and dates we do not need to write to you...</u>

3. The day of the Lord will be both terrific and horrific.

1 Thessalonians 5:2-3—...For you know very well that the <u>day of the Lord</u> will come like a <u>thief in the night</u>. While people are saying, "Peace and safety," destruction will come on them <u>suddenly</u>, as labor pains on a pregnant woman, and they will not escape.

4. The rapture of the saints could happen both today or tomorrow.

> Be ready and waiting.

1 Thessalonians 5:4—But you, <u>brothers and sisters</u>, are <u>not in darkness</u> so that this day should surprise you like a thief.

> Live righteous lives.

1 Thessalonians 5:5—You are all <u>children of the light</u> and children of the day. <u>We do not</u> belong to the night or to the darkness.

> Be alert and self-controlled.

1 Thessalonians 5:6-7—So then, <u>let us not be like others, who are asleep</u>, but <u>let us be awake</u> and sober. For those who sleep, sleep at night, and those who get drunk, get drunk at night.

> Be full of faith, love, and hope.

1 Thessalonians 5:8—But since we <u>belong to the day</u>, let us be sober, putting on <u>faith and love</u> as a breastplate, and the <u>hope of salvation</u> as a helmet.

> Rejoice in your salvation.

1 Thessalonians 5:9-10—For God did not appoint us to suffer wrath but to <u>receive</u> <u>salvation</u> through our Lord Jesus Christ. <u>He died for us so that</u>, whether we are awake or asleep, we may live together with him.

> Encourage one another.

1 Thessalonians 5:11—Therefore <u>encourage one another</u> and <u>build each other up</u>, just as in fact you are doing.
